

Stockbridge Primary and Pre-School News A 'family' of children The behaviour policy has been a big shift

As I write, we are staring down the end of November and starting to think about Christmas. The advent calendars are ordered, the candles are in for the wreath to use in collective worship and talk of Santa is just about being held at bay! In school, we have established traditions that some younger readers who have been in our school with me in the last 11 years will hopefully remember fondly. Everything we do at Christmas is about bringing people together; the nativity service in St Peter's Church, which is always packed to the rafters, is a really special time for those with young children and our Upper School children follow this with a carol service bringing all of their parents and grandparents together. We've missed this for the last 3 Christmases because of COVID so this year will be particularly poignant. We go to the pantomime – this year we're off on an adventure to Newbury's Watermill theatre for a very special kind of performance in a unique setting - brilliant for getting the awe and wonder in. In addition, we enjoy Christmas lunch with the whole school, carols around the tree and decorating the school - all important milestones in the countdown to Christmas.

You may remember being in a 'house' team in school certainly at secondary school, this is commonplace. Here at Stockbridge, children are grouped into 'families'; 4 separate groups of mixed ages across the school, each with about 36 children. Within their groups, children are 'buddied' older with younger so that they always have a friend to play with. Far from being the 'house' or 'family' that is only rolled out on sports day, we live and breathe these groupings. Families sit together at lunch, each child with their buddy. Older children help carry trays, serve drinks and cut up food, if needed. Younger ones have an older buddy to play with or seek out at playtime and lunchtime and we even walk to church with our buddy too. This system is a great way of fostering care and love for other people instead of always thinking about ourselves; making the shift from an egocentric way of looking at the world to a collaborative one (and this is one of our school values!). Christmas is a time when this system comes into its own and we do lots of activities in the wider school in our family groups.

We will return to school in January ready to do battle with the school development plan for the spring term. This year, we are focusing on just three priorities:

- 1) Ensuring our core skills of phonics/spelling, handwriting, times tables and mental arithmetic are strong in all our learners
- 2) Promoting multiculturalism and ensuring we represent our diverse world in the texts and experiences we offer through our curriculum
- 3) Developing a greater sense of intrinsic motivation for all learners. We have made a big change in our behaviour policy approach, and we want to ensure this has time to become embedded and that we critically analyse the impact on learning and general behaviours.

The behaviour policy has been a big shift for us away from punitive consequences and based more on a relational approach – something we pride ourselves on in our school. Children have been learning about the effort and skills needed to get out of any learning pit – our next magazine contribution will be written by the children all about this.

Enjoy the festive season and getting together with loved ones. We will be!

RING FOR THE CORONATION

In the British Isles we have around 6,000 peals of bells; this

means there are almost 38,000 bells which can be rung. With only around 30,000 bell ringers, we will be hard pushed to ensure all the bells across our country can ring out for the coronation of King Charles III. For the death and funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, we bell ringers hopped from tower to tower, to ensure as many peals of bells as possible were tolled or rung at some stage. Our Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) has put out an appeal to recruit more ringers, so that all (or as many as possible) of our church bells around the country can ring out for this rare and important event.


Following the pandemic, the number of ringing teachers was greatly reduced around the country for various reasons. Our own Winchester and Portsmouth Guild was no different and this has made regular training sessions difficult. We are now putting in place district 'hubs' of learning, with experienced teachers offering regular and intense sessions for bell handling.

With our splendid computer simulator for silent ringing, Stockbridge is likely to be one of these hubs and our benefice alone has peals of bells in Stockbridge, Longstock, Leckford, Houghton, Broughton and Mottisfont, with small bands of dedicated ringers who multi-task across the churches. Across the Guild there are churches with no regular ringers at all.

It's been a strange sort of year....

Harvest started and very quickly finished due to the

very hot weather. This picture shows a combine that was working near Stockbridge at the start of harvest. Who would have thought that most of the combining would have been completed by the end of August?



Maize-cutting season started but, sadly, due to the lack of rain the crops were at best poor which will be a real worry for farmers of livestock during the winter.



This was probably one of the best crops of maize I saw being cut this year. I have seen and cut maize that stood so high that you had a job to see through the windscreen of the forage harvester.

All fingers were crossed when drilling started ready for next year's crops as the ground was very dry but, as things turned out, luckily the rain did come so the crops for next year had a good start.

September is my favourite time of the year - still warm and light and the start of ploughing matches and dealer demonstrations.

I just love this picture, taken at a ploughing match when a group of gentlemen found the ideal spot to stop and have a cup of tea and a chat.



Lindy Lou's Kitchen Recipes & Crafty Corner



This year, of all years, it feels like we all need to think more about our friends and family. I think there is no better way to make them feel special than by giving homemade goodies. It's a way of giving a little of yourself. This biscuit recipe is both simple and quick to make but, placed in an old clean jar and edged with ribbon, it makes a lovely gift. Great for children to try.

It does require a food mixer or processor, but they are absolutely delicious!

Cheese and caraway shortbread biscuits

Makes 50-60

You will need a baking sheet and greaseproof paper

Ingredients

4oz (120g) Manchego cheese - see tips below

4oz (120g) butter - grated

4oz (120g) plain flour

1 tsp hot mustard powder

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp fine white pepper

1 tbsp lightly roasted caraway seeds

1 beaten egg for glazing

Method

Preheat the oven to 375°F (190°C). It's best to use the non-fan setting if you have one.

Place all the ingredients except the egg into a food processor and blitz it for about a minute until it's all combined into a ball.

Divide the mixture into two and roll into two long sausages. The best way to do this is to place the mixture on to greaseproof paper and roll it within the paper to stop it sticking to you and the worksurface!

Slice the shortbread into thin discs and place on a baking sheet covered with more greaseproof.

Brush well with the beaten egg.

Bake for 10-12 minutes until golden and crispy. The biscuits might be frayed at the edges, but they should be crumbly in the centre.

Allow to cool slightly and either place in the jar or, if you can't resist it, just eat them!

Tips

You can use any strong cheese such as cheddar or gruyere but not Brie or softer cheeses. Also consider other herbs such as rosemary or thyme in order to make a selection box.

Restoration of Stockbridge Town Hall - Part 2

We asked Hugh Saxton to recall the Town Hall restoration project when he was Chairman of the Town Hall Committee. He continues from last month with an account of how the necessary funds were raised.

When our architect (Linda Brown RIBA) drew up the specification for the rebuilding in the space between the hall and Little Wyke it was clear we would need well over £300,000 - a daunting sum.

Apart from our funds from running the hall we had, thanks to George McMeekin, undertakings totalling £37,250 from Hampshire County Council, Test Valley Borough Council and Stockbridge Parish Council. That was all there was. Fortunately, we soon learned of two possible sources of larger sums. These need a little explanation:

<u>SEEDA</u>: The South East England Development Agency was a Government-funded body with a responsibility for promoting economic development in the South East. A sub-group, the Market Towns Initiative, aimed to help communities such as ours and was represented by Anne Harrison of Hampshire Council who was Market Towns Manager. After we had applied, SEEDA offered £130,000 to various projects in Stockbridge of which £80,000 was for the Town Hall.

VEOLIA: In 1996, the Government introduced a Landfill Tax. This aimed to deter the use of landfill by waste disposal companies. However, the companies could reduce their tax liability by making payments to the Landfill Communities Fund. This was a system for providing donations to community or environmental projects in the vicinity of a landfill site. The idea was to offset any harmful effects from having a landfill site in your area. Veolia, a major waste disposal company, had such a scheme and we were within the required distance of a site. Because we were improving a public amenity our project qualified. So we applied and were allocated £89,796.

At this stage, we felt able to make a local appeal which, with Gift Aid enhancement, raised about £29,000. As our own funds were in the region of £90,000, we now had a total of nearly £330,000. This was close to our architect's estimate and we therefore asked for tenders.

With much more to be done, we continued to appeal to local organisations and raise funds in other ways. By late 2009, we were gratified to have secured these new, local, sources:

The Houghton Fishing Club	12,000
Film Shows (approx.)	2,000
Ian Weatherhead (donated picture)	1,750
Melville Charitable Trust (staged over 5 yrs) 1,250
Leckford Estate (Water Gardens opening)	1,800
Peter Barker-Mill Charity	1,000
Stockbridge Country Market (approx.)	800
Waitrose (local outlets – approx.)	500
The Court Leet of Stockbridge	300
Hawk Engineering & Fabrication Ltd	300
Total	£21,700

It goes without saying that we continued to approach charities and, over time, gained further funding. By this stage the 'rolling snowball effect' in fund-raising was helping. In other words, when people can see your success, they may be more inclined to support you.

One donation which made a huge difference was from a Stockbridge resident, Margaret Humber, now, sadly, deceased. She gave the money to open the blocked-up windows. And one substantial later donation was almost £60,000 from Viridor, another waste disposal company. But undoubtedly the turning point was the SEEDA grant. Not only was it substantial in itself but it gave us credibility with Veolia and other donors.

The Town Hall Team

The Town Hall Committee changed over time but in the earlier days it was:

Hugh Saxton (Chairman), Geoff Cox (Treasurer), Mandy Henley (Bookings Coordinator), Barry Mitchell (Maintenance Coordinator), David Baseley, Joyce Compton, Richard Gueterbock, Jean Knight and Roger Tym.

Later, Robin Colenso joined as Treasurer, Mark Frank to advise on a booking system and Kim Candler to replace Richard Gueterbock, Joyce Compton and Jean Knight.

Maddie Hedley and Mike Liberson were also on the committee for a time.

Everyone contributed in some way to the fundraising and others in the community joined at times. For example, Michael Woodhall, then our County Councillor, joined Richard Gueterbock, David Baseley and Hugh Saxton in a team which drove to Bexhill to make the presentation to Veolia.

Special mention must be made of Anne Harrison of Hampshire County Council who helped immeasurably, guiding us in the application to the Market Towns Initiative and later in finding money to pay for the plate glass windows.

Chilbolton Mother named on The Independent's 'Happy List' for her work helping Ukrainians

If you are a regular reader of this magazine, you will already know about S & L (Stockbridge & Longstock) Homes for Ukraine. We are an informal group of local residents who, over the last six months, have successfully worked with Ukrainians to integrate them locally, not just in Stockbridge & Longstock but also in Broughton, Clatford, Grateley and, more recently, we have a new host in Crawley.

The group, including hosts, guests and helpers, meets every so often to exchange ideas, stories and generally support each other. Friday 21st October was one such evening at the Town Hall when we were pleased to welcome many new attendees to hear our speakers, Harriet Asher and Rosie Wilcock.

Harriet, a young mum of three from Chilbolton, was recently named as one of 50 people on the Independent newspaper's 'Happy List' for her work helping refugees get out of Ukraine. Harriet was an early member to our group and in the first few days of the



Russian invasion, desperate to help, she travelled to the Polish border.

An emotional Harriet told us how, in her words, she met "many normal people doing wonderful things." Not her plan, and unbeknown to her husband, she found herself with a Serbian journalist crossing the border into Ukraine. Mainstream charities such as the Red Cross were nowhere to be seen (that still being the case) and, with the real concern over people-trafficking, Harriet quickly identified a need for safe travel and accommodation.

With each coach costing up to £8,000, she set up a *Go Fund* page and raised over £39,000. Receiving thousands of messages for help from traumatised families, Harriet organises evacuations, safe houses and safe passage for those wanting to leave all parts of Ukraine to safety. Harriet planned to return to Ukraine in November to join a transport and take with her donated boxes for orphans aged between 6 months and 14 years. Each box contained a pair of pyjamas, warm socks, gloves and hat and "a teddy bear."

Our second speaker, Rosie Wilcock, from Weyhill, is a host herself and is part of an organisation called Sunflower Sisters which, like Harriet, organises aid to Ukraine and helps evacuate those fleeing the war. Rosie also worked for a period of time with TVBC as a Refugee Caseworker.

With many Ukrainians reaching the six-month point of the Scheme, Rosie discussed the support available for



refugee housing. Thankfully most hosts have agreed to extend their hosting to 12 months but, after that, there is a pending homelessness issue. With social housing in high demand and low supply in the Test Valley, Ukrainian guests will, at the 12 month point, have to join a waiting list just like anyone else. Ukrainian guests in the Test Valley have limited options available for future housing, which include re-matching to a host if available and private rental. Both options require effort and support from the local community. A working group to try and recruit new hosts and future landlords has been formed. It aims to support TVBC in their statutory role to prevent homelessness. Anybody interested in hosting or renting to a Ukrainian Family are encouraged to get in touch at hutestvalley@gmail.com.



Save the Date 27-29 January 2023 (and don't forget to register in December)

If you were one of the 700,000 people who took part in the RSPB birdwatch in January 2022, you will be interested to know that the top 10 garden bird sightings were:

House Sparrow, Blue Tit, Starling, Woodpigeon, Blackbird, Robin, Goldfinch, Great Tit, Magpie, Chaffinch.

The RSPB is inviting registrations by mid-December for January's Birdwatch which takes place over the 27 - 29 January.

Sharing your dinner with the birds



At this time of year, put out food and water on a regular basis. In severe weather, feed twice daily if you can - in the morning and in the early afternoon. Birds require high-energy (high-fat) foods during the cold winter to maintain fat reserves to survive the frosty nights.

Use only good-quality food and scraps (suggestions below). Always adjust the quantity given to the demand and never allow uneaten food to accumulate around the feeders. Once you establish a feeding routine, try not to change it as the birds will become used to it and time their visits to your garden accordingly.

Good hygiene is vital in all seasons, or feeding may do more harm than good. Cleaning feeders, bird tables and bird baths to keep the birds that use them fit, healthy and disease free is very important and needs to be carried out regularly.

Many kitchen scraps and Christmas leftovers make ideal snacks for birds visiting your garden and can help them get the food they need to survive. Here's a quick guide to what you can put out:

Fat - fat from cuts of meat (only from unsalted varieties) can be put out in large pieces, from which birds such as tits can remove morsels. Make sure they are well anchored to prevent large birds flying away with the whole piece. Cooked turkey fat from roasting tins is NOT suitable for birds.

Roast potatoes - cold and opened up, these will be eaten by most garden birds.

Vegetables - cold Brussels sprouts, parsnips or carrots will be eaten by starlings and other birds. Don't put out more than will be eaten in one day otherwise you run the risk of attracting rats.

Fruit - excess or bruised apples, pears and other fruit are very popular with all thrushes, tits and starlings. Cut them up and leave them on the bird table or on the ground.

Pastry - cooked or uncooked is excellent, especially if made with real fats.

Cheese - Hard bits of cheese are a favourite with robins, dunnocks, blackbirds and song thrushes. It will also help wrens if placed under hedgerows and other areas in your garden where you have noticed them feeding. Avoid very strong or blue cheeses.

Dried fruits - raisins, sultanas and currants are particularly enjoyed by blackbirds, song thrushes and robins.

Biscuits and cake - Stale cake and broken pieces of biscuits from the bottom of the tin are high in fat and ideal for birds in the winter.

To help you in your search for the ideal Christmas present for a gardening friend or something for your own green-fingered list for Santa, I have been scouring the gardening websites for the more unusual and strange objects considered 'a must' for the keen gardener.

Intrigued by a post for the *Bee Drinking Glass Ball*, I delved further, to discover not some strange killer, intent on ridding the world of bees, but coloured glass globes with indentations shallow enough to catch rain water for thirsty bees, without drowning them. Silly me, I thought they managed quite well with rain drops caught in leaves.

Magic Manure Brew Bags seemed a much more down-to-earth option, although worm manure home-brew didn't seem to offer the same allure as hops. But these brew bags use worm manure to make rich, organic plant fertiliser, not a strange new flavour beer. I wonder how many worms were at work for this particular offering.

An absolute 'must' for the female gardener is a personalised female garden gnome. Simply send a selection of head shots, hair and eye colour and you could have your own lookalike gnome for your patio, with an option for tattoos if you want them.

I must admit the *Boozy Gardener's Kit* tempted me more but, as you have to grow the plants first to use in your cocktails, I'm not sure I'd have the patience to wait for that first magic cocktail mix.

Or there's the *Grow Your Own Weird Vegetable Patch Kit*, with seeds of strange-looking vegetables. The jury's still out on that one; and if actually growing vegetables seems too much like hard work, why not go for the *Wooden Grow Your Own Garden Set*? As the name suggests, it's made entirely from wood and can be enjoyed in the comfort of your own home – no need to step outside or do a stroke of work!

Terracotta Flowerpot Men, personalised with your and your partner's names brought back happy childhood memories of Bill, Ben and Little Weed (an incomprehensible reference for those under a certain age...) but I think happy memories is how they should remain.

As I searched for something at least useful, I came across teaspoons shaped like little spades and shovels, presumably to remind you of your garden chores even while you're having your well-earned tea break.



An apparently effective and sweet-smelling alternative to more traditional fertilisers for outdoor and indoor plants is dried alpaca poo; it comes in a brown paper bag and looks rather like coffee beans. Stockbridge Parish Council News

Pavement and Gully Clearance

Stockbridge Parish Council has been working with TVBC to regularise the cleaning of the pavements and the gullies. A pavement sweeper aims to visit Stockbridge fortnightly on a Wednesday and the gully machine will visit on a Monday. They will aim to do both sides of the road on the same day. If cars are in the way, the gully cleaner will move round them but this is obviously not ideal. It would be helpful if residents with off street parking could remember to park off the High street on Sunday night.

Leaf Clearance

TVBC's annual leaf clearance started on Monday 24 October and will take around eight weeks to complete. TVBC are targeting areas that regularly accumulate a lot of leaves but they are responding to ad-hoc requests to clear debris. If you wish to report an area to be cleared or would like more information, please contact Pete Legg, Environmental Services Manager on 8136 or email plegg@testvalley.gov.uk

Sustainable Warmth Scheme

TVBC residents can now get help with their rising energy bills by applying for a grant of up to £25,000 for sustainable home improvements. The new Sustainable Warmth scheme funded by the Government is managed by City Energy working in partnership with TVBC. Grants ranging from £5,000 to £25,000 (depending on various factors) will cover up to 100% of the costs for various energysaving improvements such as installing insulation, heating system upgrades, energy efficient hot water solutions, solar panels and energy efficient lighting (among other improvements). The funding is targeted at residents who are most likely to be impacted by the high cost of rising bills. Residents can find further information and check if they are eligible at www.hampshire-applications.co.uk/, or telephone City Energy on 02921 680951 and press one for scheme applications. City Energy is the supply partner and will manage the process.

Consultations

Both TVBC and HCC are currently undertaking public consultations. TVBC is consulting on its Draft Statement of Community Involvement in Planning (SCI) 2022, and on its updated draft Infrastructure and Developer Contributions Supplementary Planning Document (SPD). Both consultations close on Friday 16 December. HCC is consulting on its minerals and waste plan. There will be public exhibitions taking place at various venues across Hampshire until mid-December. The consultation closes at 5pm on Tuesday 31 January 2023. Road Works

There will be programmed overnight road closures to enable surface carriageway repairs:

A30 London Road Stockbridge (from Winton Hill to Stockbridge Road) starting 5 December
A3057 Romsey Road Wherwell (from Winchester Road to near Fullerton Road) starting 8th December.
The works at each location will take up to 3 nights to complete and to undertake them safely, a road closure will be in place from approximately 20:00 - 06:00 hours each day. The road will be open outside of these hours. More information is available on Stockbridge Parish Council website

Gibbon's Years by Jock Macdonald

The title of this book is intriguing, but I am going to leave it at that and hasten the reader to obtain a copy as, on the back cover, all is explained!

Jock Macdonald has provided us with a book that is both readable and thought-provoking. It covers his early life in India, growing up in Scotland in the 50s, and following schooling at Glenalmond College, his progress to Oxford where he read PPE. He then embarked on a career in teaching, from which he retired after 37 years at Winchester as Deputy Master. Interestingly, he taught our current Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, on whom he has a bit to say. Running parallel with his teaching life in Winchester is his lifelong interest in classical history, literature, archaeology and astrology.

He weaves an interesting and amusing course through the book, including tales of the purchase of two stone-built cottages in Umbria and of holiday times spent in them and of quirky happenings - all of which is treated with warmth and humour. He describes his time scraping carefully away on excavations in the late Roman cemetery at Lankhills, Winchester and, finally, one should not forget Jock's great interest in astrology and he discusses the casting of people's fortunes! Latterly, he has been very involved with the effects of climate change and the environment.

What makes this book more than a friendly memoir is the intent behind it. Jock is a serious and committed environmentalist and fully realises that here we all are, in the second decade of the 21st century, staring potential disaster in the face. He is aware that it is difficult for the individual to make an impression on a global scale but nevertheless urges us all to speak out loudly. He is certainly playing his part through this autobiography.

We also enjoy hearing recommendations from customers and of course we do our best to keep up with all the latest news in publishing.


This year has been a great one for new titles and we have some favourites we'd love to recommend for your Christmas gift ideas. Alongside these are others hot off the press, as yet to be 'tested' by us but which come with great accolades, stunning reviews and much anticipation.



Let's start with The Seven Moons of Maali Almeida by Shehan Karunatilaka, this year's Booker Prize winner. A fast-paced witty satire, this whodunnit with a generous dose of magical realism, explores the carnage of Sri Lanka's civil wars. Equally assured and powerful is Bonnie Garmus's first novel, Lessons in Chemistry. It is a


highly enjoyable, funny

and deeply-moving story that finds the reader rooting for the heroine in her battle for equality in the early 1960's workplace. The plot is broad and quirky, the characters rounded and recognisable, and the book gives us one of the most lovable dogs in literary **BONNE GARMUS** history!




We also recommend Alan Garner's latest novel, The Treacle Walker. It is possible to read this in one sitting, although the atmosphere lingers long after and the impulse to re-read it straight away is strong. Garner is best known for his children's books, rich in fantasy and folklore - probably the most famous being The Owl Service. This latest, which was shortlisted for the Booker Prize, is suitable for adults and confident young readers alike.

Local author Barney Norris published his latest novel Undercurrent this year. An introspective and thoughtful tale it explores how family stories shape us and how we navigate loss. This novel, like his previous work, is a favourite with us at The Bookmark!



Another of our recommendations, this one with a musical bent, is the autobiography Surrender by Bono of the mega-band U2. Illustrated with photographs and drawings by Bono, it is a book pulsing with energy and very entertaining. And Bob Dylan's The Philosophy of Modern Song traces the origins and interpretations of many popular tunes.



New fiction titles from great modern British authors include Lessons by Ian McEwan, Shrines of Gaiety by Kate Atkinson, and The Romantic by William Boyd. For those interested in current affairs, politics and real lives, you need look no further than The Climate Book, a collection of essays from global experts in the fields of

science, mathematics, philosophy, history and many other disciplines, curated by Greta Thunberg. Also new on the shelves is Ben MacIntyre's most recent, assured and gripping book *Colditz*, a vivid account of both the inmates and jailers of the infamous prison, and the second part of the indomitable nonagenarian Lady Anne Glenconner's autobiography, Whatever Next?

There are also, as ever, a wonderful selection of children's books. New titles from favourite authors include Which Way to Anywhere by Cressida Cowell

(How to Train Your Dragon, Wizards of Once), Flying Scotsman and the Best Birthday Ever, a new picture book from Michael Morpurgo, and not one, but two, new titles from Julia Donaldson's unending imagination: The Baddies and What the



Ladybird Heard at Christmas. A new re-telling of a Hans Christian Anderson classic, The Little Match Girl Strikes Back is by popular award-winning children's author Emma Carroll, distinctively illustrated by Lauren Child (Charlie and Lola).

Perennial Christmas children's favourites include Christmasaurus by Tom Fletcher which now has a new follow-up, The Christmasaurus and the Naughty List; The Snowman by Raymond Briggs (also available as a re-telling by Michael Morpurgo and a version from the much-loved film) as well as Susan Cooper's classic *The Dark is Rising* which is particularly magical to read in real time, beginning on the winter solstice just before Christmas.

St Peter's and Old St Peter's Stockbridge





In early November, we celebrated All Souls Day with a service in St Peter's Church. Our Team Minister, Sue Kipling, led a moving service remembering those of our loved ones who have died in the last year or even those whom we remember from many years ago. She and our Church Warden, David Williams, read out all the names provided by parishioners to be especially remembered and the congregation lit candles during the service.

On Armistice Day, the Rector led a short service at our beautiful Lutyens War Memorial. At the 11th hour of the 11th month, a two-



minute silence commemorated the dead. In attendance and laying a wreath were the children and staff from the Primary School.

Our Rector Phill led the Remembrance Sunday service two days later in St Peter's Church. It was attended by hundreds with standing room only after all the pews and seats were filled. As well as our local congregation and many visitors, were dozens of children from both Stockbridge Primary and Secondary Schools, of whom a selected number did beautiful readings. There were also large numbers of the Scout Group and Brownies who carried their banners up to the altar and then subsequently down the High Street to the War Memorial. During the service, David Williams read out the Stockbridge Roll of Honour, giving additional details about the place and date of death of each person. John Gale said the Exhortation and James Leslie read the Kohima Epitaph. Thirty uniformed servicemen and women attended from the Army Air Corps and they led the procession down the High Street after the service to the War Memorial. Police officers, led by our own Sergeant Jeremy Bouhay, carried out traffic control for the



event, ensuring quiet for both the procession to the War Memorial and the service there, including the the two-minute silence, and the wreath-laying. The cornet player, Richard King, played the Last Post and the Reveille at both events.

We pay tribute in this way to all those who lost their lives in serving their country during two world wars. We also recognise the massive contribution of the Royal British Legion whose work to support veterans and their families continues unabated. Under the strong leadership of Angela McMeekin, dozens of residents gave their time during early November to sell poppies and raise money for the cause. They were recognised and thanked during the Poppy Lunch which Angela organised, as always, at the Army Air Corps Museum on Remembrance Sunday.

Many thanks are due, not only to the poppy sellers, but also to the many people, including Pauline Webster and Bruce and Catherine Williams, who helped the Church Warden organise the event, and to the dedicated Church members who prepared our two churches for Remembrance. The Scouts had made two very impressive First World War soldiers out of bubblewrap who stood on guard at the entrance to St Peter's. St Peter's was immaculately cleaned and decorated with poppy displays for the occasion. Old St Peter's also had lovely displays of greenery and poppies for their service, and as a background for anyone who dropped in to pray or to find silence for remembering. Everyone who contributes to these support tasks throughout the year is highly valued and appreciated.

The gravity and horrors of the First World War were recorded by poets and writers. Our local cinema showed the film, *Benediction*, which brings one of our best known war poets Siegfried Sassoon's life to the screen. He was born into the Jewish faith but converted to Roman Catholicism after the First World War. Here are haunting words from his poem, "The Death Bed": "But death replied: 'I chose him'. So he went, and there was silence in the summer night". *continued overleaf*.

St Peter's and Old St Peter's Stockbridge continued



Remembrance over, the following week took us to the last Sunday in the liturgical year. The choir joined the festival of Christ the King. The significance of this festival was explained by Henri Nouwen in his "Sabbatical Journey" where he points out that "Christ is presented to us as the mocked King on the Cross as well as the King of the Universe... and all through the year we have to stay close to the humiliation as well as to the victory of Christ, because we are called to live both in our daily lives". This was followed by Advent Sunday on the 27th November and the joyful period of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming of Jesus Christ.

The day after Remembrance Sunday, the Foord family sadly held the funeral of the remarkable Frances Foord who died in October. On behalf of St Peter's, condolences were offered to the Foords who have lost two of their family in close succession.

Looking ahead

December 3rd will see the Christmas lights turned on in the evening of the "Christmas at Stockbridge" day. After the lights are lit, there will be drinks in the Church and the choir will sing some carols.

There will be teas in the Church on December 4th for those who live alone.

The Carol Service in St Peter's will be at 6pm on 16th December, joined by the congregation from the Roman Catholic Church. For the children, there is the Christmas Story at 6pm on Christmas Eve, followed at 11.30pm by Midnight Mass.
